My Second Session at College

114 Berkely St. Glasgow. Sat. 10th No^r 1888
Monday 5th

Left home at 7.30 Mother coming with me to see my luggage properly packed. We reached Glasgow about 10 a.m. And proceeded to the Royal Bank where we saw Uncle John. I then proceeded up to the University & enrolled in the Middle Latin, Middle Greek & Junior Mathematical classes. I met a number of my old college friends at enrolling themselves. Mother left for home in the afternoon & having a bad cold I remained indoors all night. My room is about 6 yards long by 4 broad On one side is the door & an unclosed bed. The fireplace & window is at one end. Mrs McHirdy, the landlady, seems a very kindly individual.

Tuesday

Spent an hour with Uncle (m.d.) &
had a walk. ^{Wednesday} attended the entrance
exam' for the Middle Latin at 7:45

a.m. A very stiff paper on grammar
& prose composition. ^{Thursday} Professor Jack

opened the Mathematical class at 9.

Lord Lytton gave his Rectorial
