# The Diary of James Dunlop

The following are copied of a scroll  
of rough jottings I made on a sheet  
of paper after I had finished my last  
Diary.

<sup>saturday</sup> Monday, 21, April, 1884

Aunt Sarah and Candy left at four  
o'clock. Mr Browning the preacher  
arrived at six. I went with him up to  
the top of Duncruine. I afterwards  
skinned a bulfinch that was given me  
<sup>sunday</sup> to stuff. I was at church. Mr Browning  
preached on Luke 9th 24<sup>th</sup>. Late our  
old cat was found at the back of one  
of the bedroom grates. We could not  
tell how she got there. But she was going  
about in the morning. In the forenoon  
I walked up to the Scroggs with Mr Brown-  
ing, and had some fencing practice with  
him. He left in the afternoon. Mr Boyd  
and Adam Wilson were in during the

afternoon and stayed to tea.

Wednesday, 23 April, 1884.

Tuesday Dr Kelly of Dumbarton came in after breakfast. He left after dinner. I went two miles down the road with him. Wednesday I dug a part of my flower border in the forenoon and evening. The bantam hen was set with five eggs to-day.

Thursday, 25, April, 1884.

I was working in the garden all day, and finished my border. The new iron gate leading into the park was put up to-day. I got four barrowfuls of fine earth out of the holes dug for the posts.

Friday I dug among my ferns. In the evening I walked up to Calderwood Station, for some cabbage plants, that were to come with the train. Poppy's leg is a great deal better.

Saturday, 26, April, 1884.

In the forenoon I swept the coals,  
and in the afternoon I planted some  
thimble seeds in my border. I got a mole  
in one of the traps this morning.

Wednesday, 30, April, 1884.

<sup>sunday</sup> I was at church. Payne preached on  
~~2 Peter 2<sup>nd</sup> ch 9<sup>th</sup>~~ (c. Noah a preacher of  
righteousness) <sup>Monday</sup> Mr. Wilson of Drymen  
called during the afternoon. Mrs. McAdam  
and Mrs. Ch. Gurn also called and stayed  
to tea. The eggs of the water pipit (~~takes~~ the  
proper name of which is dipper or water  
Duzel) are out. I was shown the nest  
of a wagtail (properly yellow) wagtail,  
the eggs are five in number and of  
mottled brown in colour. <sup>Tuesday</sup> I am four-  
teen years old to-day. Mrs. Richardson  
sent me a very nice spencel ~~in case~~  
Mama gave me half a crown & one two shilling

I worked in the garden the most of  
the day. I got another mole <sup>wednesday</sup> It was  
wed <sup>during</sup> mood of to day. I discovered three  
birds nests at the burn side, a jenny  
wrens, a blackbird, and a robins.

<sup>Thursday</sup> Friday, 2, May, 1884.

I got a mole. I got a birds egg  
pure white with a few red ticks  
at one end. Christopher Mann dropped  
in and stayed to tea.

<sup>Saturday</sup> Saturday, 3, May, 1884.

I found a finches nest with four  
eggs in it. It is very cold and sleet  
showers are falling.

<sup>Wednesday</sup> Wednesday, 7, May

I was at church, Papa lectured on edcs  
4<sup>th</sup> 13-22<sup>nd</sup> <sup>Monday</sup> I found a blackbirds  
nest <sup>Tuesday</sup> Papa left at eight o'clock for  
Edinburgh to attend the meeting of  
Gynod. I found a ducks nest in the

glen with an egg in it. I gave the egg to Mrs Churdach to whom the ducks belong. I got a fine view of the Dippers. Wrote to papa. Got some barrowfuls of fine road earth for the garden. It rained very heavily most of the day.

I got a mole, ~~and~~ wrote to papa

Saturday, 10, May, 1884.

Wrote to papa on Thursday and Friday.  
Saturday I got a letter from papa, he came home in the forenoon, brought me a graphic, and a birthday present from Mrs Whyle of £1<sup>0</sup>"0"

Sunday Monday, 12, May, 1884.

Papa exchanged with Mr Wilson, who lectured on Genesis 47<sup>th</sup>. Papa left this morning for Edinburgh. I got a mole this morning, making altogether five.

Tuesday Wednesday, 14, May, 1884.

I worked in the garden during

evening. The cat had three kittens. We  
kept one. <sup>Wednesday</sup> I worked in the garden most  
of the day. Papa came home with  
the last train. He brought me this  
diary.

<sup>Thursday</sup> Saturday, 17, May, 1884.

I was sick in the morning. But  
got better through the day. I sowed  
some flower seeds in the garden. <sup>Friday</sup> nothing  
out of the way occurred. It was very wet

Monday, 18, May, 1884

<sup>Sunday</sup> I was at church. Papa lectured on  
acts 4<sup>th</sup> 23-31<sup>st</sup>. <sup>Monday</sup> I got a letter from  
Jack McLean. Uncle Tom ~~from~~ Liverpool  
arrived at four o'clock. Maude is in bed  
with lumbago. It was very wet in the  
afternoon.

Thursday, 21, May, 1884

<sup>Tuesday</sup> In the forenoon Uncle Tom and I

walked up to the Scrags, in the evening  
we walked along to the Main and  
called on Mrs McDonald. I sowed some  
annual seeds. Mr Richardson, his and his  
~~b.~~<sup>Wednesday</sup>. arrived at 7 o'clock. I was down  
at the Inlet with Mr Richardson fishing  
Mrs R.<sup>is</sup> ~~is~~ <sup>reached</sup> caught 8 and I 3. Mr Richardson  
and Uncle Tom left after five

Monday, 26, May, 1884.

~~Friday~~  
Mrs Barber and a small boy five years old  
called L. Buchanan came in during the  
forenoon. Arthur Mann was along  
and stayed for a few hours. Mrs  
Barber and the small boy left in the fore-  
noon. Mrs Richardson and I went up  
with them to Balclutha Station. I planted  
out. ~~one~~<sup>a bushel</sup> off the canary plants. I was at  
church. Papa preached on Proverbs  
15<sup>th</sup> ch 3<sup>rd</sup>. <sup>submorn</sup> Papa was at Dumbarton  
In the afternoon I was down at the loch,

Wednesday, 28, May, 1884.

Tuesday  
Jeanie, Crossy, and I were along at  
the Mains to dinner and tea, we  
<sup>on this Main was along in the Wednesday</sup>  
stayed all day. Dr. Hall of Dumbarton  
has spent all the day with us. Adams  
Wilson called during the evening.

Saturday, 31, May, 1884.

Thursday  
We went a walk up to the Scruggs  
in the evening. Friday  
in the forenoon. Saturday  
Papa and I went  
down the road and met Mr. McQueen  
of Minigavie <sup>that</sup> who is to preach at the  
sacrament. One of the cats brought  
in a small rabbit alive. I took it  
down to the glen and let it loose  
and it ran into a hole. I planted  
Indian corn in the front garden. I was  
at church in the afternoon Mr.  
McQueen preached on Romans 8:14 and  
I went with Mrs. McQueen to the lock show <sup>in the evening</sup>.

Sunday Monday, 2, June, 1884.

It was the sacrament. I was out in the forenoon and evening. In the forenoon <sup>in the forenoon</sup> Papa preached on Revelation VII<sup>th</sup>-XIII-XIV<sup>th</sup>. Mr. McDowell in the evening on on 1 Peter II<sup>nd</sup> 111<sup>rd</sup>. <sup>Monday</sup> Mr. Lindsay of Balfron (who was to preach) arrived early in the forenoon. I was at church. Mr. Lindsay preached on 1 Timothy VI<sup>th</sup> & VI<sup>th</sup>. Mr. Wilson of Drymen was down. Mr. McDowell, Mr. Lindsay, and Mr. Wilson left after tea. I killed a lot of snails in the evening with salt, their ~~to~~ being a great number of them out on account of the rain after ten days drount.

Wednesday, 4, June, 1884.

Wednesday I was down with Papa and came at the marriage of Mr. William Macpherson to Miss Isabella Mr. Keen of the Glen. Papa married them. Mrs. Macadam of

the Moins sent us along a number  
of jasmines, stocks, and asters. We  
were very busy and putting them  
into the ground.

Thursday, 6, June, 1884.

Thursday

It was very wet all day, <sup>Friday</sup> Miss Meach  
(schoolhouse) was ~~an~~ <sup>out</sup> to sea. I got my  
Boys Own Paper to-day. We were up at  
ocklock in the evening, and in the afternoon  
we called on the newly married couple at  
France.

Tuesday, 10, June, 1884.

Saturday

We went out a walk and called a Townfoot  
and the Dan. I was a church. Papa lectured  
on edcs 18<sup>th</sup> 32-35<sup>th</sup>. <sup>Monday</sup> Jeannie and Bessy  
left for Edinburgh in the morning.  
Mama accompanied them to Glasgow  
In the evening I went up to Ballochmore  
Station and met on the <sup>Tuesday</sup> <sup>station to meet him</sup> at the presbytery at Dumbarton. I went half way with

Tuesday, 19<sup>th</sup> ~~Jun~~, 1884.

I got a book of instruction on the pianoforte from Jeanie Richardson, and two on the conservetone from Grisby. I wrote to Gallery McLean on Wednesday. Papa and I started for Kilngarie on Saturday morning, we got a drive to Balloch. We first went up to Glasgow and went out to Uncle John's (Dr.) We went out to Kilngarie with Uncle John and got there at three o'clock. Papa preached in the evening but I did not go out. ~~After he came~~ back Uncle John, Papa and I walked out to the Buchanans of Dungallow.

<sup>Sunday</sup> I was out both forenoon and evening. We were at supper at Mr Macqueans. Papa and I went in to Glasgow with Uncle John, we took the train to Kilmarnock and saw grandfather.

We had dinner at Uncle George's and left at four o'clock. we stayed all night at Uncle John's (as) and came home this afternoon. ~~He~~ Papa took me in <sup>and showed me</sup> Glasgow cathedral. It was very hot warm to-day.

Friday, 20 June, 1884.

<sup>wednesday</sup> I sorted my rockery in the afternoon  
<sup>Thursday</sup> Nothing unusual occurred. <sup>Friday</sup> I got a letter from Jack O'Leary.

Saturday, 21 June, 1884.

In the forenoon I hoed up some potatoes. In the afternoon cut the verges. In the evening walked with Papa up to Danerune Farm

Wednesday, 22 June, 1884.

<sup>Sunday</sup> I was at church. Papa preached on 2 Samial XVII<sup>26</sup>. <sup>Monday</sup> clothing etc out of the way occurred. <sup>Tuesday</sup> On the evening Papa and I walked up to Blairquhinan. <sup>Wednesday</sup> Worked in the

garden in the evening.

Thursday Friday, 23, June, 1884.

Lucie Mann and Hilda came in during the forenoon. We got some ferns out of the bridge. It was very hot to-day.

Saturday, 28, June, 1884.

I went down to the Lock with Harry Mann, in the afternoon. It has been extremely warm to-day.

Tuesday, 1, July, 1884.

Sunday I was at church. Papa lectured on effects W<sup>ch</sup> 36-37<sup>th</sup> V<sup>th</sup> 1-11<sup>th</sup>. Monday Uncle John from Alingavie, ~~came~~ to see us having got a drive. He left at half past five. I was up at the man's in the evening. Tuesday Lucie and Hilda were down in the afternoon and evening and stayed to tea.

Thursday, 3, July, 1884

Wednesday Worked in the garden during the

afternoon. Was up at the Manns in the evening. <sup>of Saturday</sup> Papa left in the morning for Balfour, where he was to preach. Mama went with him. Worked in the garden during the day. Papa and Anna came home at about seven o'clock.

Saturday, 5 July, 1884.

~~Friday~~ I was up at the Manns in the evening. <sup>Saturday</sup> I was up at the Manns in the forenoon and afternoon playing lawn tennis.

Tuesday, 8 July, 1884.

<sup>Sunday</sup> I was at church. Papa preached on Genesis XLII<sup>ch</sup>. 36<sup>m</sup>. <sup>Mondy</sup> Was very wet. <sup>Tuesday</sup> I got a letter from Jack McLean. I was in the afternoon and evening, playing lawn tennis. I got my Boys Own Paper. Notes taken during a visit to Edinburgh.

~~Wednesday~~ Thursday, 10 July, 1884

Papa and I left for Edinburgh at 7:30.  
We arrived about twelve o'clock, and  
went out to the Richardsons. Papa left  
for home, in the afternoon. I went down  
in the evening to Mr White, and went  
with him to Mrs Begbie's, where I played  
at quills and bagatelle.

Friday, 11, July, 1884.

I went into town with Miss and Miss L  
Richardson and saw the Loan Exhibition  
of Scottish National Portraits. Mr  
Richardson joined us and we went to  
Mrs Bryden's, and returned in time for  
dinner at 5 o'clock. Played lawn  
Tennis in the evening. I was at the  
Cathedral.

Saturday, 12, July, 1884.

Went with Miss and Miss L Richardson to  
the Caledonian Museum, Statue, and  
National Gallery. In the afternoon

we saw the Reform Demonstration from a window. It took an hour to pass, Between 20 and 30 thousand persons took part in it. In the evening we played at Lawn Tennis.

Monday, 14, July, 1884.

<sup>Sunday</sup> I was at church twice. Dr Black lectured on Ephesians v<sup>th</sup> 16<sup>or</sup> in the forenoon, and preached in the afternoon on John v<sup>th</sup> 12<sup>or</sup> <sup>Monday</sup> We went down to Portobello, and spent the ~~forenoon~~ forenoon and afternoon walking about on the sands. Played Lawn Tennis in the evening.

Wednesday, 16, July, 1884.

<sup>Tuesday</sup> I was down at the Botanical Gardens in the afternoon. I was in the museum and St Giles' cathedral, Was out at sea in the evening, with Miss and Miss Richardson

~~Wednesday~~ Saturday, 17, July, 1884.

~~Wednesday~~ <sup>Saturday</sup> I was at an evening party with the Richardsons. I was at Holyrood Palace

and walked along the top of the Salisbury  
Bags. Played Lawn Tennis.

Monday, 20, July, 1884.

<sup>Sunday</sup> Was at church. <sup>Monday</sup> I was at the Forestry  
Exhibition with Mr. Richardson. I  
liked it very much.

Wednesday, 21, July, 1884

<sup>Tuesday</sup> Played at Lawn Tennis. <sup>Wednesday</sup> Was at the  
Forestry Exhibition with Miss and Miss  
Richardson, seeing the grounds  
illuminated.

Thursday, 22, July, 1884

I saw the boys of George Watson's College  
get their prizes. <sup>Friday</sup> Was at the Show of  
the Highland and Agricultural Society.

<sup>Saturday</sup> Called on Mrs. Herlason with Miss  
Richardson. <sup>Sunday</sup> <sup>Monday</sup> <sup>Tuesday</sup> <sup>Wednesday</sup> <sup>Thursday</sup> <sup>Friday</sup> <sup>Maria</sup>  
Was at church. <sup>Wednesday</sup> Maria  
arrived. <sup>Thursday</sup> Played at Lawn Tennis. <sup>Friday</sup> <sup>Saturday</sup> Maria  
and I arrived ~~at~~ home on Friday night.  
I enjoyed my visit very much.

Thursday, 7, August, 1884

Sunday I was at church. Papa lectured on etc.,  
Vch 17-32 <sup>Monday</sup> I was up at the Mann's in the  
evening playing lawn tennis. <sup>Wednesday</sup> I was out a  
walk with Papa.

Thursday, 14, August, 1884.

Saturday, 14, May, 1887.  
Mr. and Mrs. Richardson arrived shortly before two o'clock. Mr. Richardson left in the afternoon. I was up at the Manns in the evening, playing lawn tennis. I was at church. Papa preached on ~~the~~ 2 Corinthians <sup>Sunday</sup> XII<sup>th</sup> 10<sup>th</sup> (When I am weak, then am I strong)  
Monday I was up at the Manns in the evening.  
Tuesday

~~Tuesday~~ ~~Wednesday~~ ~~Thursday~~ Papa was at Dumbarton attending a meeting of presbytery. We had a tremendous thunderstorm that lasted from nine o'clock in the morning till six at night. The Manns were all down to tea.

Saturday, 16, August, 1884

~~Friday~~ Nothing particular occurred. Mr Jeffrie  
who was to assist at the sacrament,  
did not arrive & in time to preach, so  
Papa had to preach himself, which he did  
on 2 Kings v<sup>ch</sup> 12<sup>th</sup>. Mr Jeffrie arrived when  
we were in church. I was up at the clams  
in the evening practicing jumping.

Wednesday, 20, August, 1884

~~Sunday~~ I was at church. Papa preached on  
Amos IV<sup>ch</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> (Prepare to meet thy God, O  
Israel) in the forenoon, and Mr Jeffrie  
in the evening on Acts VI<sup>ch</sup> 15<sup>th</sup>. ~~Monday~~ Mr  
Jeffrie and Mrs Richardson left in the  
morning. I was up at the clams in the  
evening. ~~Tuesday~~ I was up at the clams in the evening  
playing Lawn Tennis. ~~Wednesday~~ I was down at the  
loch in the afternoon ~~and~~ with Lure,  
Hilda and Filda. They were down in  
the evening.

Friday, 22, August, 1884.

~~Yesterday~~ I was down at the loch in the afternoon with the Manns. I was up at breakfast with papa in the afternoon.

Saturday, 23, August, 1884.

We got ~~three~~ <sup>three</sup> waggons of hay in during the forenoon. I walked over to Drymen and back. Luié and Hatty Mann were down in the afternoon. I played lawn tennis in the evening.

Wednesday, 17, September, 1884.

The following are written from memory, and odd notes taken during my holidays.

Monday, 25, August, 1884.

Grandmama was exceptionally well all day. But after retiring to her room ~~she~~ had a shock, and got <sup>rapping</sup> worse. and died at 5 o'clock. Granny was always very kind to me. We all went up to

Glasgow to see Uncle John. He took me out to Milngavie with him. Where I stayed till Thursday morning. and then went into town with Uncle, I then met papa and we went on board the steamer "Claymore"

Steamer "Claymore". Thursday, 28, August, 1884

Started from Glasgow at 2<sup>..</sup>30. River more like ink than water. We arrived at Greenock at 5 o'clock. Had a short walk. Came aboard and had tea.

Started at six. The wind got very cold. we are off the south end of Arron just now. The "Claymore" is a <sup>very</sup> fine steamer, and can ~~take~~ <sup>carry</sup> between four and five hundred passengers.

Friday, 29, August, 1884.

It was rather rough at the Mull of Kintyre. We arrived at Oban

at 5 o'clock. Had a turn in the town. Reached Tobermory at 11<sup>th</sup> 30. Had a short walk. Started again. Called at the Island of Egg, Glenelg; and various other places. It was good fun watching the ferry boats being loaded, everybody in a great hurry, and shouting <sup>in English & Gaelic</sup> out directions. Arrived at Portree at nine o'clock, and had a walk through the town. Saw great variety of scenery.

Saturday, 30, August, 1884.

We arrived at Lochinver at 9 in the morning, and met Mrs Smith at the hotel. Mr was away fishing. Papa met an old friend of his a Mr Logan with his wife. Went <sup>Wednesday, 2.8</sup> a walk.

Sunday ~~Monday~~, September, 1884.

W<sup>as</sup> at the Free Church, two miles away <sup>Monday</sup> Mr & Mrs Smith, Mr & Mrs Logan. Papa and I went to a loch Beonnie five miles

away. Very lonely place, no house in sight.  
We got ~~for~~<sup>Saturday</sup> about forty small trout. Papa  
and I went a walk five miles into the country  
<sup>Wednesday</sup>  
We fished a small loch called ~~Hawley~~<sup>Hawley</sup>. Papa  
caught three small trout.

Saturday, 4, September, 1884.

I was out sea fishing with Mr & Mrs Smith  
and Mr & Mrs Logan. Mrs Smith caught  
a 13 lb cod. I caught a flounder and two  
cod. We got thirty lb weight in all.

Saturday, 6, September, 1884.

<sup>Friday</sup> Mr & Mrs Smith and Mr & Mrs Logan were away  
fishing at Loch Beonieh. Papa and I  
walked over and saw how they were  
getting on. They got 6 trout. <sup>Saturday</sup> We went a  
walk through the Hawley grounds in the  
afternoon.

Tuesday, 9, September, 1884.

<sup>Sunday</sup> We visited the Free Church. Mr Logan preached.  
<sup>Monday</sup> Papa and I were up at Loch Hawley. Mr Logan

caught a trout weighing 3 $\frac{1}{2}$  lbs, in Loch  
Blannoch. Papa & I were fishing on Loch Coulag.  
Started for home in the steamer "Blansman" on  
Wednesday night.

Lochinver is an arm of the sea running  
two or three miles inland. The country is  
wild and rocky, and covered by luxuriant  
heather. A number of trees ~~have~~ been planted  
which greatly improves the appearance of  
the district. Two rivers run into the  
sea, the Inver and the Coulag. A large  
number of lochs of various sizes are  
scattered over the surface of the parish.

Saturday, 13, September, 1884.

Had a walk through Stornoway in the  
morning. Saw the herring fleet coming in.  
Called at Harris and Portree. Had a walk  
through Oban, passed the Cull of Gandy  
in daylight. Sea very smooth. Arrived  
at Glasgow in the morning. Then went up

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to Uncle John's. <sup>John's</sup> Met mama ~~in~~ at station, and we all went out to Kilngavie with Uncle John. <sup>Sunday</sup> Was at church. <sup>Monday</sup> We went into Glasgow in the morning. Papa and mama went out to Kilmarnock to see grandfather. I went out to Uncle John's (D.), where papa and mama joined me in the afternoon, and we all went home together, arriving at the steamer at eight o'clock.

<sup>Tuesday</sup> Wednesday, 17, September, 1884.  
Aunt Sarah and a cousin of hers a Miss Winch cliff arrived in the evening. They ~~were~~ left the steamer at Balmaha and came over <sup>and met them at</sup> in a small boat to the other. I went down <sup>Wednesday</sup> to the shore ~~to meet~~ them. I was up at the manns in the evening.

End of stray notes.

<sup>Thursday</sup> Friday, 18, September, 1884.  
Aunt Sarah, Miss Winch cliff, Mama and I went out a row in our boat to

Inchaber and along the shore. <sup>Saturday</sup> Aunt Sarah and Miss Inchcliff left in the afternoon.

Monday, 22, September, 1884.

~~Saturday~~ Papa left in the forenoon for Dumbarton where he is to preach. Miss B. Leith called with <sup>and the kitten</sup> a small kitten — which we named Henry Box. Mr Paton <sup>guitar</sup> the preacher arrived in the evening. I was at church. Mr Paton lectured on Genesis XII. 1<sup>st</sup> and preached on 2<sup>nd</sup> Corinthians 4<sup>th</sup> v 7<sup>th</sup>. <sup>Wednesday</sup> Mr Paton left in the morning. Papa returned in the afternoon.

Wednesday, 24, September, 1884.

<sup>Tuesday</sup> Nothing particular occurred. <sup>Wednesday</sup> Went a walk with papa 1½ miles along the road. Wed day

Saturday, 27 September, 1884.

<sup>Saturday</sup> I was up at the Marns in the afternoon. Went along the road a walk two miles along the road. <sup>Saturday</sup> Nothing particular occurred. Pulled <sup>up</sup> the apples in the afternoon.

Was up at the Manns in the evening.

~~Monday~~ Monday, 29, September, 1884.

I was at church. Papa preached on Luke ~~XVI~~<sup>ch</sup> 31<sup>or</sup> ~~Monday~~. Went a walk in the evening with papa and was up at the Manns.

~~Tuesday~~ Wednesday, 1, October, 1884.

Papa was down at Dumbarton in the forenoon. Maria and I were up at the Manns at tea. ~~Wednesday~~ Was out a short walk with papa in the evening.

~~Thursday~~ Friday, 3, October, 1884.

~~Lady~~ ~~Ridh~~ called in the afternoon. ~~Holiday~~ Weather showery.

~~Saturday~~ Monday, 6, October, 1884.

I was up at the Manns in the evening. I was at church. Papa lectured on Acts ~~W<sup>ch</sup> 1-6~~<sup>Monday</sup>. In the afternoon papa, Maria, and I walked up to Blairquhan. We returned after tea. We have had very fine weather for the past few days.

Wednesday, 8, October, 1884.

Thursday

Papa, Mama, and I started for Braggan at half past seven. We walked ~~down~~ to Balloch took the train to the pier, went on board the steamer, and arrived at Garbet at 10<sup>th</sup> 30. It was so ~~foggy~~ misty we could not see any of the hills. We walked to Corrochar, two miles, and drove <sup>\* Braggan</sup> other four in a dogcart. We found all the Braggan folks at home. I was through all the old houses and garden before I had been an hour there. We had dinner, and cousin Berry drove us to Garbet where we got the steamer at five o'clock. We got to "Balderwan" station at seven <sup>and</sup> arrived home shortly after eight. It was wet on the forenoon, nothing unusual occurred.

with us. I drove back with them <sup>4<sup>th</sup> Saturday</sup> in the evening. I enjoyed the drive very much: most of the country we drove through was entirely new to me. The view down the valley of the Lndrick with Loch Lomond in the distance was extremely fine. We arrived at Kilngarie <sup>Wednesday</sup> at 9 o'clock was striking. It was cold and foggy in the morning but cleared up a splendid day. I worked with Uncle in the garden. <sup>Thursday</sup> Uncle and I left at 9 o'clock and went into Glasgow. We then took the train to Greenock and embarked on board the Arrochar steamer. It was a splendid day and I enjoyed the ~~sail~~ <sup>sail</sup> very much. We disembarked at Murtagh an ferry and walked to Braggan 1½ mile distant. Where we were warmly welcomed. After dinner I went a drive to Tarbet with Bessie. It is a very beautiful drive the road running along the side of loch

Long. It is lined with <sup>all manner of</sup> trees and is very hilly. After tea we went out deep sea fishing and caught 18 Cod &c. <sup>Friday</sup> I had a "dip" in the sea before breakfast. Uncle John left in the afternoon, I afterwards ~~went~~ drove to Yarber and back with Bessie. I saw eleven sheep being clipped, and ~~can~~ understand how the wool sticks together after being clipped off. <sup>Saturday</sup> I went down to Marlegan with Bessie to meet Mr Hatchieson who ~~was~~ <sup>came</sup> from Manchester. He had been traveling all night ~~and~~ was rather tired after his long journey. In the afternoon I went to the top of a hill at the back of the house. It ~~was~~ not very high, but rather steep and I thought I was at the top two or three times. It ~~was~~ not a very pleasant thing at first looking downwards, but I soon got accustomed to it. I would much rather go up a hill than down.

In the evening we went out fishing and caught about a dozen fish. It came on rain before we were long out. Mr Hatcherson and <sup>sanday</sup> Jeanie, Jeanie, Bob, and myself walked to church and back and attended church.

~~had~~ In the forenoon I walked with Bob to Strone  $\frac{1}{2}$  miles along the road. In the afternoon I went with Bob to get the horses. We walked about 3 miles over the hills before we got them. Bob mounted me on one horse and himself on the other. We turned the shoulder of the hill and rode down a path half way up the side of the hill. On the one side the hill rose steeply to the top. Looking down on the other side it looked as if a stone ~~stone~~ rolled down would not stop till it reached the sea. It is not nearly so steep as it looked from the path. I managed to stick on all right though I never learned to ride and had neither bridle nor saddle.

We got to Braggan all right and had thus

Wednesday, 2, September, 1885.

Tuesday, Mr. Watson, sonny & me left at 10:30, with the postman to drive over to Lamlash. Papa, mama and I walked over to Lag to get the coach to Whiting Bay. We found ~~the boat~~ that it had started an hour before its usual time. We walked along the road a little farther, and then went down by the shore and ~~walked~~ <sup>in company</sup> along it till we got opposite Slidellay. It was very wet. <sup>Tuesday</sup> I was very wet. Papa was out fishing and caught a few trout. In the evening we walked over to Lag and back. Papa was fishing with Mr. Gibbon who is staying near Lag. We gathered a lot of mushrooms in the forenoon. We walked over to Lag and took the coach to Hildonan and Whiting Bay. We stayed an hour at Whiting Bay and then drove back to Hildonan, where we stayed

for a short time, then on to Lag and walked to Glodery. I enjoyed the drive very much. Some of  
views off the road were very fine. The one from  
above Bennen Head being the finest. Mama heard

Saturday, 19, December, 1885.

On the Monday following my last entry I went to Calderon Station and met Venie Dunton and Miss Watson. Papa who was away at Hurn attending the funeral of Mrs Ch Farlane, a cousin

of mamas. ~~Venie~~ and Miss Watson stayed with us till Tuesday of the following week. It was hard frost during most of the week. Mr Reid addressed the electors in our schoolroom on Thursday. Mr Lang schoolmaster sent out about 50 letters to different electors stating

that he intended questioning Mr Reid on dis-establishment, and that he also intended showing that he was not a fit and proper person to represent the county in parliament. A number of those to whom the letters were sent were supporters of Mr Reid and let Mr Lang's intentions be widely known. The meeting was crowded. Mr Bannering Bunting Graham occupied the chair and gave a short speech. Mr Reid spoke for about three quarters of an hour on Free Trade, Disestablishment, and the Land Laws. The great bulk of the meeting was in favour of Mr Reid and the applause completely drowned a few feeble attempts to his. Mr Lang asked a number of questions on disestablishment. He lost his temper and finally chairman put the question to the meeting whether he be allowed to put any more questions or not. The meeting decided against any more questions, and the chairman did not allow Mr Lang to put any more. Mr Reid having to be at Balloch at a certain hour to get

again. a vote of thanks for his address was accorded no time being left to discuss an amendment to a vote of confidence. Mr Lang wrote a letter to the "Dumbarton Herald" complaining of the way he had been treated. Mr R. Biblond send a reply to <sup>the</sup> next weeks "Herald" which Mr Lang answered, and was answered in his turn by Mr Biblond. I do not know whether the newspaper will continue any longer or not. I was ill during the following week with cold and soarthross. The elections began on Tuesday, ~~and~~<sup>and</sup> in consequence the newspapers were eagerly scanned every day.

~~The week~~ The Sunday following was our sacrament. Papa was assisted on Saturday and Sunday by Dr Tyfe of Kilmalcolm and on Monday by Mr Bishop of Helensburgh. Saturday, 9th January, 1886.

In the evening I was at the Ross ~~hearing~~ <sup>that Lady Leith has been teaching for some time</sup> a concert. The performers were the class of young people belonging to our congregation. A few ladies varied the programme by singing duets. <sup>Friday</sup> I enjoyed it very much. It has been hard frost for some days.

Thursday, 26th January, 1886

We have had snow constantly on the ground for nearly two weeks, but I expect that it will have all disappeared by to-morrow morning. We had also turns of hard frost but I did not get any skating as the ice was rough. On ~~Wednesday~~ last week

I was down at the pond and had an hours curling. I skated for about an hour in the afternoon. Papa left for Dumbarton where he is to preach to-morrow. Mr Rodger the preacher arrived in the evening. Mr Gladstone has accepted office.

Saturday, 13<sup>th</sup> February, 1886.

Mr Rodger left early in Monday morning. Papa arrived in the forenoon. <sup>Tuesday</sup> Papa left for Dumbarton to attend <sup>Wednesday</sup> a meeting of presbytery. He returned <sup>Wednesday</sup> in the evening, having stayed on Tuesday night with Mr Lamb of Old Kilpatrick, and attended a meeting in Glasgow on <sup>Thursday</sup> ~~Wednesday~~. <sup>Friday</sup> Nothing particular occurred. I chopped up a quantity of sticks.

Saturday, 20<sup>th</sup> February, 1886.

I was at church. Nothing particular occurred during the week. Parliament has met; but no definite proposals on the Irish or other questions have been made by the new government.

Saturday, 27<sup>th</sup> February, 1886.

I was at church. Papa lectured on Acts 1<sup>st</sup> 1-8 or <sup>Thursday</sup> Papa and I walked over to the Maine and called on Mrs Macadam. On Thursday night Mr Travillian introduced a "Crofters Bill." It seems a rather good measure, and will prevent the depopulation of the Highlands. The crofters are a fine class and must be preserved from extinction.

Saturday, 6<sup>th</sup> March, 1886.

Sunday  
I was at church. We had a fall of snow, accompanied by a gale of wind. The result has been that the snow drifted and blocked all the side-roads. Papa and I walked to Caldarval Station and went with the train to Jamestown; we returned the same way we went. Snow was lying <sup>drifted to the depth of</sup> three or four feet deep. Tomorrow being the sacrament Mr Wilson of Drymen preached in the afternoon.

Saturday, 13<sup>th</sup> March, 1886.

Mr Wilson assisted papa at the sacrament and preached in the afternoon. Wednesday  
Papa and I walked down to Jamestown; we went with the train to Caldarval and walked home. Thursday  
Papa and I walked to Boturich farm and back in the afternoon. I enjoyed the walk very much - having only once been there before. We got a fine view of the Balloch end of the loch. Saturday  
I had about  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an hour's skating. The ice was wretched. We have had hard frost every night this week, with a thaw in the day-time caused by the sun. Dr Grey's amendment

Saturday, 20<sup>th</sup> March, 1880.

I was at church. Nothing unusual happened. Mr Finlay's bill to declare the constitution of Church of Scotland "was before the House of Commons of Wednesday, and after ten speeches (five on each side) was rejected by 23 votes.<sup>in 178</sup> 23 15 Scottish members (including 6 liberals) voted for. — 36 against. 21 (including 1 tory) were absent. The established

Church party put forth all their strength. It was a very skilful move and nearly succeeded. The C. L. party have themselves broken the truce and disestablishers should not hesitate to carry the war into the enemies quarters.

Saturday, 27<sup>th</sup> March, 1886.

<sup>Sunday</sup> I was at church. I pruned the currant bushes, carried up  
<sup>Monday Tuesday Wednesday Thursday</sup> some logs from the glen &c. Papa was at Glasgow; he returns  
<sup>Friday</sup> in the evening. I went and saw the ploughing mate,  
but did not stay long as it began to rain. <sup>Saturday</sup> It rained  
nearly all day.

Saturday, 3<sup>rd</sup> April, 1686

Sunday I was at church. Nothing particular happened. Papa and I walked up to Craftfoot and afterwards called at Ellerkins; where we had tea. Bob McClean came in during the evening. Bob left in the forenoon to meet some sheep at Balloch and take them to Braemar. Saturday Kitty and Hilda Marion were down in the afternoon. Mama and I raked up the pruning and had a bonfire in the garden. Mr Chamberlain and Mr Trevelyan have resigned their seats in Mr Gladstone's

cabinet. Their places have been filled by Mr. Stanfield and Lord Dalhousie. It is a pity Mr. Gladstone did not retire at the general election, he has lost two of the ablest men in the cabinet, and his Irish bills seem likely to be defeated.

Saturday, 10<sup>th</sup> April, 1886.

<sup>sunday</sup> I was at church. In the afternoon I went half way to Calderwood to meet Mr Lindsay of Balfour, who was to address the annual missionary meeting in the evening. The meeting was held in the school-room during the evening. After a short discourse had been delivered by Mr Lindsay; the report for 1885 was read: From which it appeared that the money collected for missionary purposes and records was a few shillings less than the previous year.

A fairly satisfactory report considering the agricultural depression. Mr Lindsay left in the afternoon. <sup>(Wednesday)</sup> <sup>Thursday</sup> <sup>Friday</sup> Mr Mann called in the evening. I took a barrowful of sticks up from the glen. The ground is still too soft to allow gardening operations to begin. <sup>Saturday</sup>

On Thursday night Mr Gladstone explained <sup>his</sup> Home Rule Scheme of the Government to the House of Commons. His proposals are an Irish Parliament at Dublin to consist of (1) The 28 Irish representative peers <sup>at present</sup> that sit in the House of Lords. (2) 75 members to be elected by occupiers of £25-0-0 yearly value or upwards. Every one of these 75 men to be possessed of reality to the value of £200 per annum, or personality to the extent of £4000. 2. 206 member to be elected by the present constituents. Any act passed by a majority of the united parliament can be absolutely vetoed for three years or till a dissolution by a majority of either of the two "orders." Irish members will cease to be members of the Westminster Parliament. The New Parliament will have no power to touch the prerogatives of the Crown, nor to interfere in matters of national defence, foreign or colonial policy, nor to endow any religious denomination. The collection of the Excise and customs duties, and the control of the Irish Constabulary will not be given to the new legislature. Mr Gladstone spoke for nearly three and a half hours.

Afterwards Mr Trevelyan spoke against and Mr Parnell in favour of the bill. Last night (Friday) Mr Chamberlain ~~delivered~~ and Lord Hartington delivered strong speeches against and Mr Healy and Mr Morley in favour. Mr Chamberlain mentioned that it was proposed to buy out the Irish landlords ~~for~~ the sum of £120,000,000. Mr Gladstone objected to the Land Purchase Bill being disclosed till it was brought before Parliament, so Mr — did not disclose any more of the provisions of the L. P. B. -.

Saturday, 17<sup>th</sup> April, 1886.

<sup>Sunday</sup> I was at church. Papa lectured on Luke xix<sup>th</sup> 1-10.  
<sup>Tuesday</sup> Papa was at Dumbarton. John Bilsland commenced to dig the garden. <sup>Wednesday</sup> I was busy in the garden. I was up at the Mann's in the evening, and played at lawn tennis with Fanny, Vilda and <sup>Ballerini</sup> Miss ~~Balch~~, who is staying with them, ~~along~~ with her aunt Miss Blapperton. Worked in the garden &c. The debate on the Home Rule Bill was resumed on Monday night by Lord Randolph Churchill who strongly opposed it. Sir B. Russell and

Mr Whitbread<sup>of</sup> spoke in favour of the bill. On Tuesday Sir Wm Harcourt supported and Mr Goschen <sup>and Sir Mytch Beach</sup> opposed the bill. After Mr Gladstone had replied on the debate, the bill was read a first time without opposition. It is undoubtedly a very able scheme but I do not think it will pass. On Thursday Sir Wm. Harcourt introduced the budget. It contained no novel features. Last night Mr Gladstone introduced the Land Purchase Bill.

Saturday, 24<sup>th</sup> April, 1886.

I was at church. Papa was at Glasgow. He brought me 15 volumes of "Cassell's National Library." I think they will prove very interesting. All the garden seeds were sown. Played at Lawn Tennis in the evening. Mr Battay (an established Church minister from Glasgow who is staying with the Leiths) took tea with us. Some of the Leiths called and had afternoon tea with us. Afterwards Mr. H. & Mrs. B. had tea with John Bilsland finished the garden.

Wednesday, 5<sup>th</sup> May, 1886.

Thursday 29 April  
My birthday. I got a pencil from Mrs Richardson £1.0.0 from papa and 2/6 from mama. Mama and I went with the

8.45 train from Balloch to Glasgow. We came out at Belling  
Brook Station and had some breakfast at my uncle's the Drs.  
We saw Uncle John at the bank and afterwards met Aunt  
Maggie. I bought two bee hives, got my hair cut &c.  
We reached home <sup>Monday</sup> about eight. Papa left for Edinburgh  
to attend the Synod. I went two miles down the road  
with him. It rained slightly during part of the day;  
the first rain we have had for nearly a month. <sup>Tuesday</sup> I  
wrote to papa. I have been reading "Warren Hastings"  
by Lord Macaulay; "The Autobiography of Benjamin  
Franklin"; and, "The Rivals, and The School for Scandal"  
by Richard B. Sheridan, and have found them all  
very interesting and instructive.

Saturday, 22<sup>nd</sup> May, 1856

<sup>Friday May 21</sup> <sup>Saturday</sup>  
I got a letter from papa. Papa returned home  
<sup>Sunday</sup> <sup>10<sup>th</sup></sup> <sup>We then exchanged with Monday 10<sup>th</sup></sup> in the afternoon. Papa and I went with the  
12.55 train from Balloch to Glasgow, where we  
saw Uncle John in the Bank, and then went on  
to Edinburgh. In the evening I went with  
Mrs and Miss L. Richardson to the Synod

We stayed between three and four hours, heard a number of speeches, and then went back to with papa to ~~the Richardsons house at 78.4.~~  
<sup>then and</sup> "I went to the International Exhibition" with Miss R. early in the forenoon. We spent two hours going through the whole building, after which Miss R. left <sup>I waited</sup> ~~spent the time till~~ four o'clock examining the pictures in the Art Galleries, going through "Old Edinburgh" and watching the Machinery in Motion, which section was very interesting. In the evening Mr papa and I went and saw the Buildings and Grounds lit up with the Electric Light.  
<sup>Wednesday</sup> Papa and I went and called on Mr Logan, also The Edinburgh Picture Exhibition. We left Edinburgh about five and reached Baldarvan Station at 7. <sup>Friday</sup> Lue Mann - who has returned from a German School - was down seeing me in the evening. I had a nice walk with Lue and some other of the Manns through the Black

Sunday

Sunday morning  
Mount to Portmellon. I was at church. Harry & Henry - who has returned from Paris - called in the forenoon. Uncle John, Aunt Maggie and the whole family drove over from Milngavie and spent the day with us. It came on rain unluckily so they did not get out much. (On Tuesday we had Willie McEwen -  
who sailed for Canada on Thursday - seeing us)  
Wednesday Thursday Friday Saturday  
Two splendid days the best we have had this year.

Saturday, 10th July, 1866.

Early in June mama and I spent two days with the Richardsons in Edinburgh. I was twice in the Exhibition and thought more of it than ever. Aunt Sarah (who has sailed for Australia), paid us a flying visit before she left. The elections are nearly all over, and Mr Gladstone has lost heavily.

In Dumbartonshire the "Union" candidate was Sir A. Orr Ewing; the liberal Mr. B. G. Munro-Ferguson of Raith and Never. Sir A. Orr Ewing ~~was~~, Mr. Ferguson addressed a meeting

in our schoolroom on the 30 of June. He was in our house before and after the meeting. I went up and heard him speak which he did very well. Rev Mr Boyd and Mr Lang asked a number of questions but did not succeed in confusing Mr Ferguson. The meeting was very enthusiastic. I went down to Alexandria—where the polling was—with papa and went in and saw Aunt Blair and Gracy. Sir A. Mr. swing was returned by a majority of 32: not very much in a poll of over eight thousands.

Monday, 6<sup>th</sup> September, 1886.

The two Misses Richardson came on visit on the 20<sup>th</sup>. and stayed till the 31<sup>st</sup> of July. One fine day we all went ~~a~~ picnic to Aberfoyle. We went by train from Ballochman Station, walked nearly to the head of Loch Ard, walked back to the near end, and having hired a boat—had an hour's row, and gathered a number of water-lilies. We reached home

about five o'clock, having walked altogether 16 miles. I greatly enjoyed the day's outing. Kate Fletcher came to spend her holidays with us the same day the Richardsons left. Uncle John had a house at Skelmorlie all August. We took lodgings <sup>for a week</sup> in a house near them. On Tuesday the 17<sup>th</sup> Mama and I went with the "Ivanhoe" from Braehead to Wemyss Bay - Papa accompanying us the length of Greenock - and then walked to our house, which was about  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile from the pier. Papa and Kate came on Friday and mama and Kate went home on Saturday: papa & I on the following Tuesday. We spent our time walking about, going to pier to see the steamers start and arrive and start, and in the evening playing at games in Uncle's house. They had staying with them Mrs & Miss Roebuck, and Mrs John Dunlop. John came down from England and stayed a few days. The Mann's house is let to Miss Blapperton and two sisters of hers Mrs Bulgarnie & Mrs Harrup.

Last Tuesday Mabel & Percy Balgarnie and Kitty

Mann were down at sea. On Wednesday morning

& got the steamer to Balloch pier. thence by rail

with the occupants of Mann's house. We rowed to  
Inchcallich, went up to the burying ground, had  
a bath, rowed to Inchfad, got some milk and  
rowed home. Harry and Luie Mann were <sup>who were staying from 8.4.05</sup> with us  
<sup>Monday</sup> Papa was at Dumbarton and Glasgow. He return  
in the evening. I was fishing in the barn with Percy.  
We got three trout.

Monday, 27<sup>th</sup> September, 1886.

<sup>Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup></sup> We started from the Manse at 4:15 P.M. went with the train to Dumbarton and changed into the through train from Helensburgh to Edinburgh arriving there at 7:25. We ~~then~~ <sup>Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup></sup> went out to Mr. Richardson's and stayed over the night. We went by train to Granton and embarked on board the London steamer which sailed at three. Mrs Richardson and Jeanie saw us on board. The wind was strong but, being from the west the sea had not space to rise to any height. We got a good view of the Haddington coast. <sup>Thursday 9<sup>th</sup></sup> When I got up in the morning we were out of sight of land and opposite the Wash. We soon sighted the English coast and kept pretty close to it during the remainder of our passage, seeing Yarmouth very well. We reached London at eleven at night. It was dark when we were going ~~up~~ up the Thames so I did not see much - although the <sup>(G)</sup> were very pretty. We drove to Williamson's Hotel

Bow Lane & cheap side where we got accommoda-  
tion. We went with the "District" railway from

of glazed bricks and I think <sup>it must be</sup> about half a  
mile long — to the Colonial ~~the~~ Indian  
Exhibition. We first had a look at the ~~large~~  
then walked through the Indian part, then  
went out into the grounds, heard the organ  
played in the Albert Hall, examined the  
pictures by colonial artists, went through  
Canada, Cyprus, Malta, The Aquarium, and  
some of the Australian courts. We also saw  
the Indian workmen busy at their different  
trades. Then went back to the Hotel pretty  
tired. In the evening we ~~went~~ <sup>Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> walked down to  
London Bridge and back. We went with a bus ~~along~~  
along High Holborn and Oxford Street and  
walked through Regents Park to the Zoolog-  
ical gardens. We spent the most of the day</sup></sup>

there and saw all that was to be seen. It was very interesting. Before we started for the Zoo we went through St Paul's. In the morning we went to the <sup>Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> Metropolitan Tabernacle and heard Rev. G. H. Spurgeon preach; in the evening to St Mary Aldermanry <sup>Monday 13<sup>th</sup>. Viewed the monument erected in memory of the Great Fire of 1666 by Sir Christopher Wren, then walked to the "Tower" and went through the Jewel House and Armouries. We then went up the river to <sup>National gallery. Trafalgar square</sup> Westminster and went through W. Abbey. Afterwards we walked through St James's Green, and Hyde Parks and part of Paddington. In the evening we went to Madam Tussaud's <sup>Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> exhibition. I was rather disappointed with it. In the morning papa and I visited the Guildhall, City Picture gallery & Court. We all went and saw the British Museum, then went by boat to Greenwich and saw the Hospital museum and ~~Victor~~ galleries. The Painted Hall is very beautiful. We went back with <sup>the</sup> <sup>Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> tramway. We went out by train to the</sup></sup></sup></sup>

Crystal Palace. I got myself weighed and found  
I was 9 stones 3 lbs. I went to the top of one of the two  
water towers which are <sup>each</sup> 282 feet high and got a splendid  
view of the surrounding country. We went all over  
the building and grounds. We went up the river  
to Lew and saw the gardens. They are very  
beautiful. We went through the Museum, Palm House,  
Swan in the lake opposite to the Museum. and other Hothouses. <sup>Thursday 16<sup>th</sup></sup>

We went down ~~the~~ to Woolwich  
by boat, and from there to Bedley Heath by coach  
— the drive through the country was very nice—  
and then walked to Bedley. We went to the  
school where Andrew & Donald Fletcher are  
and spent about an hour with them. <sup>We</sup>  
Went into the Temple debating society to hear a debate. <sup>Saturday 18<sup>th</sup>  
then went back to London by train. In the  
forenoon we went through the Central Meat  
Market & Fish Markets, afterwards walked across  
Hyde Park and examined the Albert Memorial.  
We then visited South Kensington Museum. The  
collection of stuffed home birds along with their  
nests & eggs is very interesting. <sup>Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> In the forenoon</sup></sup>

we went to St Paul's in the evening to Dr M'Currie at Clap-  
ham. <sup>Monday 20<sup>th</sup></sup>

Mama and I went <sup>and</sup> to the C.W.I. Exhibition. We  
first carefully examined the Indian exhibits, then  
New Zealand, Canada, Cape of Good Hope, Natal, West African  
colonies, West Indies &c &c. The Diamond washing and  
cutting was very interesting. <sup>Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup>We went to the Japanese  
Village; where we saw Japanese natives working at different  
trades. It was peculiar and rather interesting. From  
there we walked to Westminster and, - after waiting  
for 40 minutes we saw Mr Gladstone pass in to the  
House of Commons. Went a walk round St Paul's  
churchyard and up the Thames Embankment.  
Sailed from London at 4 o'clock, - got a good  
view of the country on either bank. <sup>Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> It was rather  
rough as we got out to sea. The sea was rough  
& I was a little sick. We saw the Yorkshire coast.  
<sup>Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup>  
We arrived early in the morning at Granton and  
went by train to Edinburgh and by car to the  
Richardsons. I went with George and Emily to  
the exhibition and spent two hours there. Papa</sup></sup></sup>

waited in Edinburgh but onama and I left <sup>for home</sup> at 4 o'clock. We arrived safely between 7 & 8, and found all well. Mr Goodfellow (the preacher) arrived in <sup>saturday 25<sup>th</sup></sup> the afternoon. I was at church. Mrs G. preached. <sup>monday 28<sup>th</sup></sup> Mr Goodfellow left in the forenoon. I was up at the Mann's in the evening.

Wednesday, 29<sup>th</sup> September, 1886.

<sup>Tuesday</sup> In the afternoon I walked up to baldarvan Station thinking that I might meet papa. I met him with Uncle Tom and Teevie. <sup>Wednesday</sup> Uncle Tom & Teevie left this morning. It has rained heavily all day.

Monday, 25<sup>th</sup> October, 1886.

<sup>monday, 25, sun</sup> In the afternoon Beasy and I walked to baldarvan Station, went by train to Balloch Pier, and with the steamer to Tarbet, where we found bally with the dog-cart, and reached broggar safely before eight o'clock. <sup>friday, 1, october</sup> In the forenoon I assisted at drawing of the old ewes at the banks beside the house. In the afternoon

bally and I went out fishing and got a dozen and  
a half. I was up at the tanks in the glen. I was at  
church at Arrochar. I was at Arrochar with Bal in the  
machine. I walked a bit down the Garelochhead road.  
I was at a sheep gathering at Invergavin, with  
with Bal. I got a lesson in cutting up a sheep.  
I got ~~the~~<sup>after Friday</sup> ~~the~~<sup>Friday</sup> cold and so did not get out for  
some days. I was at a geographical lecture  
in the Tarbet Free church. Aunt went away to Edinburgh  
& Bob to Loch Lomond. Bal drove me to Tarbet and I  
got home all right in the afternoon. I was at church.  
Papa exchanged with Mr Wilson. Mama and I  
were down at Alexandria. I have been very busy  
with my lessons, getting my bees housed, potatoes  
&c.

Saturday, 30<sup>th</sup> October, 1886.

Bob McLean stopped here for a hour & a half in  
the forenoon. He was Kilearn with four scores of  
sheep; he left one behind that was knocked up,  
it died in a short time, and I managed,

with assistance, to skin <sup>and</sup> afterward bury  
it. <sup>Wednesday</sup> I got the brackens carried up <sup>cut &</sup> to the barn.  
<sup>Thursday</sup> Mama started for Milngavie. Adam and  
Charles Wilson walked down from Drymen  
and spent the afternoon and evening with  
us. <sup>Friday</sup> Mama returned in the afternoon. <sup>Saturday</sup> I was  
busy at making a bee-house.

<sup>Monday</sup> Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> November, 1886

I got the wooden covering I had made put over  
one of the sheep. <sup>Thursday</sup> Papa and I walked up to the  
Mains and stayed to tea. I was busy making a  
cover for another of my sheep. Mr. Meikle (the preacher)  
arrived. Papa was left for Fife Malcolm, where  
he is to preach. John Maclean (who has got a factor-  
ship in Dorothea) arrived late at night.

<sup>Monday</sup> Saturday, 13<sup>th</sup> November, 1886.

<sup>Monday</sup> Jack left in the forenoon, and Mr. Meikle in the  
afternoon. <sup>Tuesday</sup> Bally Maclean arrived in the evening.  
<sup>Wednesday</sup> Mama, Bally, and I were at tea at the Barn  
<sup>Thursday</sup> Bally left in the morning. I commenced to feed

my bees.

Saturday, 20<sup>th</sup> November, 1886.

I have been ill with cold, and have been compelled to stay in the house nearly all week. Papa left for Dundee yesterday. He is to preach in Mr. Drummond's church. Mr. Davidson, the preacher, arrived this evening.

Saturday, 27<sup>th</sup> November, 1886.

<sup>Monday</sup> Mr. Davidson left in the forenoon. <sup>Tuesday</sup> Papa returned in the evening. He stayed on Monday night at Uncle John's (Dr.) and the ordination of Mr. Morton to High Street Church, Dumbarton on Tuesday. Nothing particular occurred during the remainder of the week. I have been busy with lessons &c. The weather has been so mild up till now, that I have been cutting grass in the garden: the frost not having yet spoiled it, or stopped its growth. Yesterday I saw a man gathering brambles, and to-day found several <sup>showed me how</sup> traps in the garden. John Balsland helped me to set two traps in the glen, but I did not get any rabbits.

Saturday, 4<sup>th</sup> December, 1886.

<sup>Thursday</sup>  
"Midge", the dog we have had for more than twelve years, died in the forenoon. She had been ill for some weeks: I shall never again hear her sharp bark or wonder at the activity of her tail. I went up the Calderavan road and met Dr Wilson, who is to assist at the sacrament. I was at church in the afternoon. We have had frost during the greater part of the week, and it looks as if it would continue. I have been reading speeches by Lords Aberdeen and Blyth, and Mr John Morley, and particularly admire the first address delivered by Lord Aberdeen at Glasgow.

Saturday, 11<sup>th</sup> December, 1886.

<sup>unday</sup>  
I was at church. Dr Wilson left in the afternoon. I accompanied him two miles down the road.  
<sup>Monday</sup>  
<sup>Wednesday</sup>  
Mr McCandless & Miss Macgoun called during the afternoon. I fed the bees. It snowed during the night. Uncle Robert has given up Bragan and is going to retire from farming.

<sup>Monday</sup> Saturday, 18<sup>th</sup> December, 1886.

Adam Wilson came in at breakfast time on his way home,  
old Kilpatrick; where he had been preaching. He stayed  
till the afternoon — I accompanied him two miles along  
the Drymen road. I walked to Blairquhan with Mam  
and had 1½ hours skating on Balderwan loch.

<sup>Saturday</sup> I walked to b. loch and had some hours skating  
in the forenoon. It has been hard frost all  
week.

<sup>Monday</sup> Saturday, 25<sup>th</sup> December, 1886.

Mr Wilson of Drymen walked down, and spent the after-  
noon & part of the evening with us. I walked up to  
b. loch and had an hour's skating. Papie was out  
visiting all day. It began to thaw. I walked to  
Balloch, went by train to Alexandria, got my hair  
cut, saw Aunt Blair de Grace, and returned by  
Balderwan Station: I met Adam, Charles, and two other  
<sup>Wednesday</sup> of the Wilsons at Balloch. Lady Leith called in the  
afternoon, and gave me a present of a fox-terrier;  
<sup>Friday</sup> he is called "Sam," and seems a very nice dog.

Saturday

I have got 7 Xmas cards, 10/-, and a book for Auto-graphs. This is a very disagreeable day: cold and wet.

Tuesday

Saturday, 1<sup>st</sup> January, 1887.

Mama and I were at an entertainment given by Mrs Macadam in the public school. A conjurer performed a number of tricks. We were down at the Ross Xmas tree. Mama and I were at an entertainment given by the Misses McHenry in Arcloch Bridge school — magic lantern &c.

Saturday, 8<sup>th</sup> January, 1887.

I have had cold and have been kept indoors during the most of the week. On Thursday papa and mama were at Drymen; attending a soiree given to Mr Wilson's S. School <sup>including</sup>. I walked down to the curling pond and watched the play for an hour. The ground is covered with two or three inches of snow.

Saturday, 15<sup>th</sup> January, 1886.

Nothing noteworthy occurred during the week; it has thawed and frozen again. Poor "Dad" took distemper, and had to be killed. He was a nice dispositions dog, and we were sorry to lose him.

Saturday, 22<sup>nd</sup> January, 1887.

The frost has left for the present. Papa and I cut down a tree in the glen to-day. Great interest is being taken in the candidate of Mr Gooch for the Exchange division of Liverpool. His success would be a <sup>great</sup> triumph, but his defeat would be a greater blow to the government.

<sup>Friday 26<sup>th</sup></sup> January. Saturday, 5<sup>th</sup> February, 1887.

Papa was at Kilmarnock attending the funeral of his cousin <sup>Saturday 24<sup>th</sup></sup> Mrs Gilchrist. I walked to Drymen and back. Mama and I walked up to the Mains and called on Mr Macadam. Nothing particular occurred this week. Mr Gooch was defeated at Liverpool by a majority of 7 votes.

Saturday, 12<sup>th</sup> February, 1887.

<sup>Tuesday</sup> Mrs Macadam and Miss Macgown called in the afternoon. <sup>Tuesday</sup> Mama went down to Alexandria to see Aunt Blair and Grace in the forenoon. In the afternoon I walked down and we came together.

Saturday, 17<sup>th</sup> February, 1887.

Our new precentor commenced to discharge his duties last Sunday. The church is being painted.

Sunday, 16. Feb

Saturday, 19. March, 1888.

(who gave here a day's preaching)

Adam Wilson preached in the School-room; the church not being finished. The church was opened again. It looked very nice. Papa & I walked down the road 1½ miles to meet Mr McIntyre of Largo, who assisted at the sacrament. Mr McIntyre left in the afternoon. Papa & I conversed two miles and struck across the country to the moor-side. I commenced to dig the flower garden. It snowed all day. The snow continued falling till the evening. I attended the congregational practice. The snow has been gradually melting during the week. To-day I walked to Drymen and spent some hours with the Wilsons. Mama has been collecting for the Woman's Jubilee offering to the Queen.

Saturday, 9<sup>th</sup> April, 1887.

Hark Fletcher came from Helensburgh to stay over Sunday with us. I attended the practise. Our new pre-  
-centor is going to give me some lessons on the Harmonium.  
Hark left in the morning. Mama went with her to Dumbarton. In the afternoon I went two miles,

down the road to meet mama. <sup>Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup></sup>

up at Glasgow. I got my first music lesson and afterwards went to the practice. Mr Wilson came from Drymen and delivered an address at the annual missionary meeting <sup>Thursday</sup>

Moses G. & C. Leith called & spent the afternoon with us. I went to Dumbarton to meet Kate - who is to spend her holidays here. —

Saturday, 23. April, 1887.

I was busy all week digging the flower borders, and sowing flowers etc. Harry Mann was in on Friday evening. On Saturday Mrs McAdam & Miss McCoun called and took tea with us. I had my usual music lesson and attended the singing class during the evening. <sup>Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> Kate left for school. The Manns are down for the spring. Percy Balgarnie is staying with them during his holidays. It has been raining almost constantly since Tuesday. I was up at the Manns last evening. Arthur came down from Glasgow to-night but I have not seen him yet.</sup>

Saturday, 30<sup>th</sup> April, 1887.

I was up at the Manns several evenings during the week. Papa was at Glasgow on Monday and Wednesday. Yesterday was my birthday. Papa gave me 10<sup>/-</sup> & Mama 5<sup>/-</sup>. I also got a books this morning from the Richardsons.— Poor Jack, by Captain Marryat. I painted the front gate this afternoon and afterwards got <sup>my weekly</sup> music lesson.

Saturday, 21<sup>st</sup> May, 1887.

~~May 21~~  
Papa left for Edinburgh to attend the Synod on Monday forenoon and did not return till Saturday. Nothing particular occurred while he was away. I painted some of the gates. Mr Smith of Greenock was made Moderator of Synod. Papa exchanged with Mr Wilson of Drymen. On Monday he went back to the Synod and returned home late on Wednesday night. On Thursday my Uncle Dr Dunclop dropped in during the afternoon and stayed with us till Friday morning. Uncle Tom from Liverpool came unexpectedly to pay us a visit. Mr

Richardson from Edinburgh arrived in the evening.  
Uncle <sup>Thursday</sup> and went up to the station and met him.  
Mr R<sup>—</sup>, Uncle, papa & I called at the Mains. Mr <sup>Friday</sup>  
Richardson and Uncle left in the morning.  
Then brought out twelve chickens. Uncle returned  
and from Glasgow in the evening. <sup>Saturday</sup>

Saturday, 4<sup>th</sup> June, 1887.

Uncle Robert and Jeannie came to bid us ~~good by~~  
<sup>25<sup>th</sup> May</sup> see us before leaving for Dorset. Uncle & Jeannie  
left early in the morning. Papa was at an ordina-  
tion at Renton. Bob <sup>26<sup>th</sup> May</sup> McLean came in during the  
afternoon. Papa was away at Glasgow. I was down  
at the loch with Bob. Bob left in the forenoon and  
Aunt Jeannie and Beacie came in the evening. I al-  
saw them safely landed and then went back to  
Arrochar. Beacie had ~~fallen~~ never <sup>27<sup>th</sup> May</sup> in the spring &  
is not yet very strong. I attended a political  
meeting held in Alexandria. It was addressed  
by Sir Charles Ruvel 2. b. M. P. R. T. Reid 2. b. M. P.  
and W. L. Bright M. P. The speeches were all good

<sup>Friday</sup>

Papa and I walked up to Baldarvan Station and met Mr Smith of Greenock (who is to assist at the sacrament) and Mrs Smith. I was at church ~~at~~

<sup>Monday 6<sup>th</sup> June</sup>

Saturday, 9<sup>th</sup> July, 1887.

Mr Lamb of Old Kilpatrick arrived early <sup>on</sup> the morning and preached. Mr & Mrs Smith and Mr Lamb left <sup>on</sup> the afternoon. Aunt & Bevy <sup>Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup></sup> left. <sup>Monday 13<sup>th</sup></sup> Malcolm McClean arrived in the evening. I was at the Drymen Cattle Show with Malcolm, who left next morning. <sup>Thursday 16<sup>th</sup></sup> Papa and mama were at the marriage of Mr Wilson's eldest son David. They came home <sup>Friday 21<sup>st</sup></sup> in the evening accompanied by Aunt Jeanie.

Aunt, Malcolm and Bevy left Glasgow for Dorset. Nothing unusual has occurred since. I have been very busy with my bees, the garden &c. On Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> of the Misses Leith called and stayed to tea. Mrs Macadam and Miss Macgoun also called during the evening. Mama was down at the Ross this afternoon. We had Kate Fletcher with us for ten days. She left for London on Thursday

Monday, 22<sup>d</sup>. August, 1887.

On Saturday 23 July Mr & Mrs Richardson arrived. Mr R. left on the following Monday. Mrs R. stayed with us for more than a fortnight. From the 16<sup>th</sup> to the 22<sup>d</sup> of July the Dumbartonshire Volunteers were encamped at Balloch. On the 16<sup>th</sup> I rowed over with Mama and saw the camp. During the following week I was twice across. The second <sup>time</sup> I ~~returned~~. The last time I ~~returned~~ walked the whole way home. The loch being so low that I could easily waded across the mouth of the Sanderick. On Tuesday 2<sup>d</sup> August we were along at the Mains. Mrs Richardson left on Wednesday the 8<sup>th</sup>. Charles Wilson was along seeing me one day. On the 1<sup>st</sup> August Uncle John and family drove over from Milngavie and spent the day with us. I got a letter from Malcolm McLean. <sup>Thursday, 16<sup>th</sup></sup> I was down at Alexandria and saw Aunt Blair and Gracy. I afterwards called on the Balgarnies, who have taken the Mann's house. <sup>Friday</sup> I was at the Lass Games and there met Adam

and Charles Wilson. I enjoyed the games very much.  
The day was showery but not bad on the whole.  
<sup>Saturday</sup> Mama got a letter from Uncle John saying  
that Uncle Billy, who has been out in South  
America for twenty years, had arrived in Glasgow and that they would be over here on  
Monday. I was at church in the afternoon: it  
being the sacrament on Sunday. Mr Allison  
of Kilbarchan preached. Mr Allison left in  
the morning. Uncle John with Uncle Billy  
and the whole Milngavie family arrived in  
the forenoon; having driven all the way.  
They left about five leaving Uncle B.  
with us. I never saw him before. Papa  
and I intend to start on our holidays  
to-morrow. We purpost going to Balta Sound  
in the Island of Unst: the most northerly  
of the Shetland Islands. We start from  
Leith with the steamer at 6<sup>o</sup>30 on Wednes-  
day morning.

Friday, 28<sup>th</sup> October, 1887.

Tuesday, 23 Aug.

We started from the Manse at 7 in the morning and went direct to Edinburgh. I got my photograph taken. After knocking about the town for some time we went out to Mr Richardson's where we spent the night. Mr Richardson took us out a drive several miles into the country to the foot of the Pentland Hills. It was a fine evening and I enjoyed it very much. We left Hartington Gardens at 4.45 P.M., and walked ~~into~~ to the Waverley Station, and went by train to Leith, and there embarked on board the "St Magnus": a large paddle-steamer. Starting at 6.30 we were soon left Leith far behind, but after passing Anstruther on the Fife coast a dense fog settled down on the water. We went along at half-speed and every little while the steam-whistle was sounded. Twice the steamer was stopped and soundings taken. No land was seen till Aberdeen was reached at 3.0 P.M. Papa and I went ashore and walked about the city for an hour. The fog did not bother us after

we left Aberdeen and I got a very good view of the coast. It was a fine calm night. We reached Kirkwall about 5 A.M. We walked through the town and examined the cathedral externally & internally: It is a fine old building but the interior is spoiled by modern "improvements". We also saw the Bishop's Palace and the Earl's Palace.

On the way from Kirkwall to Lerwick I got a good view of Fair Isle and ~~of~~ the Tower of Mousa. We reached Lerwick at about 3 o'clock and stayed all night at the Queen's Hotel. In the evening we walked out to ~~to~~ Grimista and called on Mr Pottinger. <sup>Friday, 26<sup>th</sup> Aug</sup> We started in the morning for Balta S. with the "Earl of Yell". We first called at Symbister in the island of Whalsay, then at Gossa-brough in Yell, Aith & Houbie in Fetlar where the men who came out with the ferryboat wore shoes of untanned cow-hide. Leaving Fetlar we next touched at Mid Yell: a very pretty spot, in the midst of a barren district situated at

the head of a long narrow voe (bay). Our next halting place was at Ryeasound in the south of Unst: a bay sheltered from the <sup>other</sup> sea by an island. Finally as darkness was settling down we reached our destination Baltasound. Mrs Hunter's lodging house was full and we could not get in till next morning, when some people were leaving with the steamer. After some difficulty we found accomodation for the night in a house not far away. Baltasound is a bay nearly two miles long, protected from the open sea by an island which lies opposite its mouth: it is the most northerly harbour in the British Islands. Unst <sup>saturday 27<sup>th</sup> aug</sup> is twelve miles long by from three to four broad. It rained heavily in the morning but cleared up after a time. Papa, Mr Halliburton—a young man we met with on board the St Magnus— & I walked to Loch Blifff a narrow fresh-water loch about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles in length. It was foggy.
